Important Health Notice - Whooping Cough (Pertussis) in Wairarapa

There has been a significant increase in whooping cough in Wairarapa over recent weeks, affecting babies, children and adults.

Whooping cough is a serious infection that spreads easily between people. It causes breathing difficulties and severe coughing fits. If not treated early it can be life threatening for those most vulnerable, such as pēpi and people with low immunity.

Immunisation provides the best protection against Whooping Cough. The information sheet accompanying this notice has important information to help keep you and your whānau safe. It also explains whooping cough symptoms and what to do if you or someone in your whānau becomes unwell.

Protect yourself, your whānau, and your community. Immunise.

- Check that your pēpi/tamariki/children are up-to-date with their whooping cough immunisations.
 Vaccine is given at six weeks, three months and five months of age, with boosters at age 4 years and 11 years.
- Adults have booster vaccination against whooping cough at age 45 and age 65.
- Pregnant people / hapū māmā are strongly recommended to have a free whooping cough vaccine.
 This is available and free from 13 weeks of pregnancy, and is best given between 16 and 26 weeks.
 The vaccine helps to protect the newborn baby for their first 6 weeks until they can be vaccinated themselves.
- Early childhood workers and health professionals who have contact with babies, pregnant women and people with low immunity are recommended to have a whooping cough booster vaccine every 10 years.
